8.14.3.1.12 (AD 320).

2. Egyptian: Hieroglyphic text, part of an inscription containing a hymn to Osiris with figure of Kheruef. The text reads:

Prince, friend of the Lord of the Two Lands, Confidant of the good god, royal scribe, chief royal herald, steward of the great royal wife.

- 3. <u>Japanese</u>: The name <u>Mimaki-iri-biko</u>, written using Chinese characters purely for their phonetic values. <u>Kojiki</u> Book II, ch. 4: Sakamoto et al. 1967, I:182.
- 4. Indian: A couplet from the Rgveda:

If with the  $\underline{Yadus}$ ,  $\underline{Turevaşas}$ , ye sojourn, with  $\underline{Druhyus}$ ,  $\underline{Anus}$ ,  $\underline{P\ddot{u}rus}$ ,  $\underline{Indra-Agni!}$ 

Even from thence, ye mighty Lords, come hither, and drink libations of the flowing Soma. (Rgveda I.108.8)

KADANOR 100 [4] rams 34 kg. of wool [at] Kutaton deficit: 41 kg. of wool

7. Greek: The opening lines of Herodotus' Histories:

Herodotus of Halicarnassus, his <u>Researches</u> are here set down to preserve the memory of the past by putting on record the astonishing achievements both...(Herodotus, Histories I.1)
